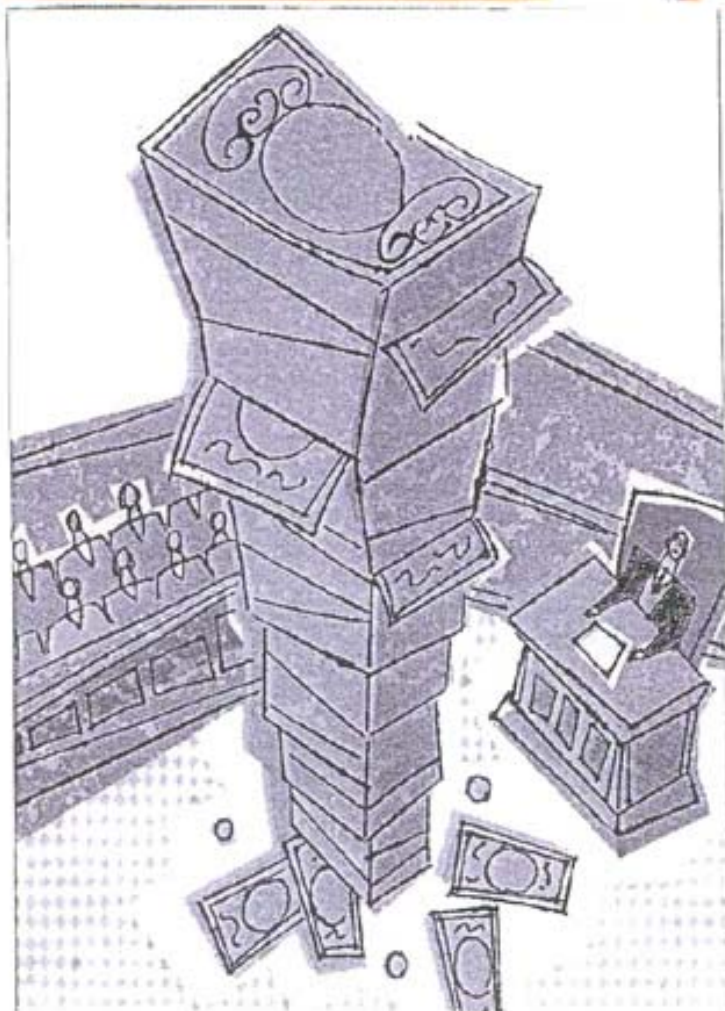

Brenda Allen, 42, sought treatment for right-leg pain and was presumptively diagnosed with a recurrent deep vein thromboses. After she was discharged, she returned with severe right-leg pain. A test revealed complete obstruction of her superficial femoral artery. A urokinase therapy was followed but her leg could not be salvaged and it was later amputated. Ms. Allen claimed doctors did not diagnose arterial occlusion in a timely fashion to avoid amputation, and that surgery should have been performed to remove blood clots. The defense claimed that Ms. Allen suffered from a clotting disorder that would have led to failure of the surgery. The jury found Dr. Michael Mesbah 80 percent liable and Catholic Medical Center 20 percent liable. Actions against Kitae Kim and Robert Solomon were discontinued prior to the trial. No liability was assigned to St. Mary's Hospital. The jury awarded Ms. Allen \$15.7 million.
